

NCLGA AGM Floor Plan





The Intersection Safety Camera (ISC) program in British Columbia is an automated traffic enforcement initiative aimed at reducing motor vehicle crashes at intersections, thereby decreasing injuries and fatalities. Established in 1999, it is a collaborative effort between the Province of BC, the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The program operates 140 digital cameras at high-risk intersections across BC, functioning 24/7. These locations were selected based on data analysis identifying intersections with frequent and severe collisions. Out of the 140 cameras, 105 monitor red light violations, while 35 are equipped to detect both red light and speeding violations.

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
